

2012 – Driving on Company Business Policy



- Eliminate The safest journey is the journey not taken
- Reduce If a journey must be made then seek to reduce the time spent in a car and therefore reduce exposure to the risk. Public transport is the preferred option



• **Control** - If travel and driving is required, ensure that the journey is properly planned and that the driver holds a valid Permit to Drive; they understand the risks; and they are properly trained. Travel should be booked through Jacobs systems




• **Protect** – If using public transport, use only licenced operators. If driving, ensure the vehicle being driven is safe for the driver and passengers.



- We work with 31 local service providers and delivery partners.




History

- Irish Water employees drive over 2,750,000 miles per annum.







Journey planning saves lives



- Is the journey necessary?
- Is public transport an option?
- Allow for distance, travel time, road and weather conditions
- Avoid driver fatigue



We must consider how to we can make sure employees have a safe experience on our roads

Managers must consider location, start & end times of meetings, appointments and field-based work assignments

If early starts and / or late finishes cannot be avoided, drivers should consider overnight accommodation to reduce the risk of fatigue.

Driver Responsibilities



Licence

 If you drive for work, you must have a full valid licence to drive the vehicle.

Roadworthiness

 Grey fleet drivers must ensure their vehicle has a valid statutory roadworthiness cert (e.g. NCT), that it is maintained in roadworthy condition and that it undergoes regular basic safety checks.

Insurance

• Drivers must have appropriate insurance cover for their vehicle that covers driving for work.

This information sheet will help you learn about the relevant legislation, duties of emplo how to implement a safe systems approach to managing driving for work. It will help:

- · employers who provide staff with vehicles (including powered two wheelers) to drive for work,
- employers who provide staff with bicycles to use for work,
- self-employed people who drive vehicles or ride motorcycles or bicycles for work.
- · employees who drive their own vehicle for work.

Driving for work involves a risk not only for drivers, but also for fellow workers and members of the public su pedestrians and other road users who share the road space. People who drive for work have a higher collision than the general driving population, even after their higher mileages are taken into account.

As an employer or self-employed person, you have a legal duty to manage the risks that employees face (and for others) when they drive for work. Businesses, employees and the community all benefit from safe drivin

You should have systems in place to make sure that employees comply with your driving for work policies. E cannot directly control road or weather conditions, but they can influence the way their employees act and I the road.

What the law requires

Health and Safety law applies to driving for work in the same way as for all work activities. As an employer, y should have a safety management system in place for managing all work related risks. Driving for work risks: managed as part of this system. You must also make sure your employees are:

- · legally entitled to drive the vehicle they are using.
- using a vehicle that is safe and roadworthy,
- trained, competent and fit to drive their vehicle safely, and
- using their vehicle safely.








Road Safety Author

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This guidance will help you learn about the legal duties of employers and how to implement a safe systems approach to managing the risk associated with driving for work in privately owned or privately leased vehicles, more commonly known as the grey fleet.

This is part of a series of resources' to help employers manage driving for work as a risk in their business. It complements the 'Managing Driving for Work My Responsibilities's information sheet, 'Safe Driving for Work Driver's Handbook's and the Managing Driving for Work e-learning courses.

What is the grey fleet?

The grey fleet is commonly defined as any vehicle that is not owned, leased or rented by an employer that is driven by an employee or a contractor making a work related journey.

This could be a financial contribution, a car obtained via an Employee Car Ownership (ECO) scheme, a privately owned vehicle used for occasional journeys or a vehicle that the employee has hired outside of any

When most businesses analyse the road journeys that their employees make on their behalf, they identify employees who they never considered as 'drivers' and who have never been included in any of the policies and procedures relating to driving for work.

Here is an example of a Safe Driving Policy which you can amend to suit the requirements of your business. This policy applies to anyone who drives as part of their work, whether driving their own vehicle or one provided by the company.

 maximum safety of the drivers, occupants and other road users, and reduce the impacts of
 company vehicles on the environment this also applies to personal vehicles used for work
 purposes.

Code of conduct

The code of conduct for [enter name of company] states: "While driving company or own vehicles for work purposes, employees must comply with traffic legislation, be conscious of road safety and demonstrate safe driving and other good road safety habits."

The following actions in company vehicles will be viewed as serious breaches of conduct and dismissal may be a consequence:


- drinking or being under the influence of drugs while driving
- driving while disqualified or not correctly licensed
- reckless or dangerous driving causing death or injury
- failing to stop after a collision
- · acquiring penalty points leading to suspension of licence


